Bookmobile for Booneville, Owsley County

Booneville, a small town in Owsley County, has never had a public library. However, there have been local efforts made this summer, toward acquiring some sort of small collection of books for the use of the community. A local minister and some college students from another state worked together and managed to collect and buy some very nice books which have been kept in the basement of a church. The next step was a conference between Mr. Mike Smathers, the minister, the students, Miss Willis, and members of the Friends of Kentucky Libraries, Incorporated to study the problems. Miss Willis offered two used bookmobiles for use. They were driven to Booneville; both were stocked with books; one bookmobile will be stationed in the town, the other will make runs.

The real difficulty at this point was to hire a librarian-driver and to find the money for his or her salary. The Friends underwrote the salary for a year - \$2400. Booneville will therefore have a functioning bookmobile-library, hopefully beginning September 1. When business starts, one bookmobile will be parked in the middle of town, in the town square by the courthouse, where it cannot possibly be overlooked. The second bookmobile will circulate books in the county.

A library board has been appointed for Booneville and the community has, in this short time, collected \$1100 from the citizens to pay expenses, in addition to salary, to keep the circulating bookmobile going for a year. May we congratulate Booneville and Owsley County on the steps already taken toward public library service. May this be just one of many steps toward a improvement of public facilities in Booneville.
